
COVID-19 GUIDELINES

Conference Etiquette

With an average of 500 attendees, a successful Anchorage AEYC Annual Conference requires that we extend professionalism and courtesy to one another. The following tips may make for a more pleasant learning environment for all:

In Remembrance **Cindy Martindale**



Cindy Martindale, former Anchorage AEYC President (1989-90), and a life member of NAEYC passed away July 20, 2022. She also served as Treasurer of the organization.

She taught at several early childhood facilities before beginning her 25 years of teaching for the Anchorage School District in 1986. She was a caring, wise and dedicated teacher. She is survived by three siblings, five children, eleven grandchildren and hundreds of students.






